It's been another good year at your Genesee County Parks. After the trials of the pandemic last year, the Parks returned to a sense of normal operations. All of the parks were open for business and we saw an increase in visitors to all facilities.

Crossroads Village reopened for the season to enthusiastic crowds and a return to business as usual. The Halloween and Christmas at Crossroads were once again popular programs. Visitors enjoyed the opportunity to return to the Village and marvel at the many holiday displays. Christmas at Crossroads opening ceremonies brought out crowds to watch the traditional lighting of the Christmas tree, participate in a community Christmas carol sing, and gaze at the fireworks show.

Wolverine Campground is experiencing a surge in popularity. Reservations continue to increase yearly with many weekends sold out at the beginning of the year. Due to interest from our camping visitors, staff recommended that we extend the camping season into October. The Commission agreed to this request and the results were very positive. We had many campers take advantage of the extended season and enjoy fall camping in Genesee County.

Campers will see the addition of new full-service campsites in the near future. Staff is diligently working to prepare the site for expansion of the campground to provide more opportunity for camping in Genesee County.

The walking and biking trails throughout the County are seeing tremendous use by residents for exercise and relaxing strolls of the many scenic views offered in the Parks.

Flushing County Park saw extensive damage from the wind storm that struck the area in 2021. Staff was able to respond quickly and perform clean-up to get the park open again for the public.

Plans are moving forward for projects on the Flint Riverfront Restoration Project. We hope to see improvements in the very near future. Stay tuned for more news on this transformational project.

Parks staff is eagerly looking forward to the coming year with new ideas and planned improvements in the Parks. Staff is always looking to offer new and exciting opportunities for our visitors and the hope the new year brings.



New entrance signs were installed in most day use parks this year, as a part of a 5 year plan to replace all park signage. The bathrooms at Linden County Park and Everett A. Cummings Event Center were painted, A new document storage building was completed at the Parks Administration Office.

Large scale clean up efforts took place after storms in August affected Flushing County Park, Linden County Park and Clover Beach. Maintenance staff cleared down trees and debris after high winds swept through the area. The bleachers at Everett A. Cummings Center were completely rebuilt in time to be used for the Genesee County Fair in August. Richfield County Park's Pavilion #2 received a new roof that will last for years to come.

In partnership with the Disability
Network, staff identified accessibility concerns
for park patrons at Buell Lake County Park and
were able to install a new accessible path
between the parking lot and restrooms.
Because this park is heavily used by adaptive
recreation groups, it was of the upmost priority
to complete.



Governor Gretchen Whitmer, as well as other local and state officials gathered at Chevy Commons on Wednesday, July 14th, 2021 to announce plans to transform it into a State Park.

As of this writing, Genesee County is the only County in Michigan that doesn't have a State Park.

Future plans for the park include the removal of the Hamilton Dam remnants and greater access to the river, improved lighting, landscaping and the addition of green infrastructure. The proposed State Park would include Chevy Commons, the Flint Riverbank Park as well as the Vietnam Veterans Park.

FOR-MAR NATURE PRESERVE & ARBORETUM

For-Mar safely re-opened the Visitor Center to the public on June 30th, 2021.

The animal exploration room was updated during the Covid-19 closure. New animal cabinets for tanks were installed and new murals of flora and fauna were added. This project was generously funded by the Friends of For-Mar Foundation.



With the help of the maintenance team the sugar shack was made more accessible through the addition of a viewing window and new limestone aggregate path next to the shack.





The new Geology Garden was completed in 2021, this garden replaces the ornamental grass garden at For-Mar. The grass garden was removed due to recent development of the non-native ornamental grasses beginning to seed out into the surrounding preserve. Its removal eliminates the potential threat of new invasive species at For-Mar. The Geology Garden will provide an interpretative opportunity for the public in the geological history of Michigan and create a place-making site for public activities.



For-Mar continued to develop and expand their educational reach through multiple programming formats. Virtual programming reached 38,621 Facebook users with 4,730 partial views and 366 full views from January through November.

In-Person programs engaged 7,684 community members in nature education. Outreach educators ventured out to Genesee County Parks, community events, private programs, and Wolverine Campground, June through November to interpret seasonal occurrences and other nature-based science topics.




A new Garden Exploration Space was developed, providing garden education both directly and passively. An activity station was installed that provides materials for visitors to use during a program or during their own exploration. The station is removable and available to visitors of any age. This project was funded by the Friends of For-Mar.



We also made a point to partner with the Disability Network of Genesee County and the Flint River Watershed Coalition to provide inclusive kayaking (ikayak) trips at Buell Lake throughout the year.

FOR-MAR PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS



The garden at the corner of Davison and Genesee roads was renovated this year. Its renovation was driven by the desire to create a garden that was easier to maintain, required fewer resources (personnel and supplies), and provide a high level of aesthetic value, while projecting the essence of For-Mar to the traveling public. Timbers from the original memorial gardens at For-Mar were repurposed to create a tiered raised bed garden around a new park sign. The timbers showcase For-Mar's history, the lower tier of plants are native wildflowers and grasses that show For-Mar's commitment to a sustainable environment, and the top tier will be planted with annual vegetation that represents For-Mar's ability to change and flourish within the community.

Black locust is an introduced invasive tree that has taken root at For-Mar. The invasive nature of this tree threatens the natural environment by reducing habitat and limiting biodiversity. In order to reclaim this habitat, park personnel spent several weeks removing and disposing of a collection of these trees.

Over the years, the trails at For-Mar have begun to narrow due to the encroachment of both native and non-native plants. In an effort to open the trails and increase public safety, staff worked on widening these trails.



HUCKLEBERRY RAILROAD

Newly rebuilt Diesel Electric Locomotive #12 arrived at the Huckleberry Railroad April 29th, 2021, after a two day journey from Pennsylvania. It was an exciting event and many staff members came to see its arrival, in spite of the cold and rain of the day.



The Railroad Shop was busy this year making repairs and improvements to Huckleberry Railroad's track and trains. 300 railroad ties were replaced and a new 250ft storage building was erected to protect railroad cars from the elements.

Premier Powder Coating of Flint helped prepare for the 2021 Summer season by donating all labor and materials as a way of giving back to Crossroads Village. The work completed includes: 28 wall brackets, 56 keepers, 56 arm brackets and 28 stanchions, all powder coated black and 28 arm rests that were powder coated in a chrome color with a clear coat on top.



#12 is a GE 50 ton Diesel Electric Locomotive with two Detroit diesel 671 engines. A narrow gauge center cab, #12 was built in 1957 for Bethlehem Steel.

Rebuilt by McHugh Locomotive, #12 was completed on April 24th, 2021.




CROSSROADS VILLAGE



Fall of 2020 began with a new spin on Holiday traditions at Crossroads Village and Huckleberry Railroad. Halloween and Christmas drive through did not bring the same kind of magic to families in Genesee County but still offered a safe alternative for guests to enjoy the village. The Halloween drive through had 7,120 cars and the Christmas drive through saw 21,868 cars. Volunteers prepared and handed out over 30,000 bags of candy.

VILLAGE ATTENDANCE





The Village reopened to the public Memorial Day weekend after being closed in 2020. New events in 2021 consisted of Michigan Timber Days and Tractor Show, Curious at Crossroads Oddities Festival and Huckleberry Railroads Enchanted Village. Genesee County Day grew this year, with many County Departments in attendance, as well as the edition of Food Trucks. Day Out with Thomas returned and had a great turnout with over 8,000 visitors.

Crossroads Village maintenance worked hard all year on various projects. Many of the doors and windows throughout the village were restored, along with repairs of ramps and new porches were built. Several areas received new paint jobs and touch ups, including the Gazebo, our brochure kiosk and the volunteer booth. The Genesee Belle received a new cooler. The Fox House received all new siding and a partial roof and the Clayton Township Hall received an entirely new tin roof.






THE MOUNDS, WOLVERINE CAMPGROUND & TOLLBOOTHS



The Mounds ORV Park had a sizable increase in usage during the 2021 operating season. Over 10,000 passes were sold, including 713 season permits. Customer satisfaction is at an all-time high after noticeable improvements were made during the summer. New trail marker signs were installed throughout the park in addition to a new map and rules sign near the parking lot entrance. Maintenance staff worked diligently and added 800 tons of rock to improve and stabilize existing trails.

Wolverine Campground opened April 29th in 2021, one month earlier than usual. This was the first time opening before Memorial Day and campers were eager to start the camping season. Yearly revenue reached a record high of \$539,000, a \$200,000 increase from the 2020 season. Numerous Park improvements over the past few seasons have contributed to an increase in usage and revenue. A new privacy fence was installed on the East side of the campground and campers showed great excitement with the recent upgrade of 37 campsites to 50 amp electric and water service. Usage in the peak of summer averaged 80-100% capacity on weekends. When fall arrived, staff planted 12 new trees including 6 maples and a variety of other native species. Tree planting is now a yearly project to responsibly maintain and preserve our natural resources for many years to come.



The Genesee County Parks Boat Launches experienced another busy summer on the Holloway Reservoir and Mott Lake. Expanded parking and signage was a great addition at Walleye-Pike Boat Launch to help meet demands during busy weekends. An ADA accessible kayak launch was added at Bluegill Boat Launch next to the existing docks. The new launch is universally accessible, making it easy to use for all park patrons and a great resource to allow disabled visitors access to our waterways.







RANGERS

The Ranger division stayed consistent with its values and mission over the course of 2021. Statistics remained relatively the same as the focus of the Ranger Division continues to be to provide an all-inclusive, safe, family friendly experience for everyone. With the thousands of miles driven and thousands of community police contacts we continue to show our presence in all the parks to make people feel safe and continue to return to the parks system to enjoy all we have to offer. In 2022 we will continue to ensure our policing remains focused in the Genesee County Parks system.

Keep Genesee County Beautiful brought in grants totaling \$535,625 from funders including: the Ruth Mott Foundation, the Community Foundation of Greater Flint, the Genesee Area Focus Fund, Keep America Beautiful, and the National Recreation and Park Association.

63 parks and 37 gateway gardens were maintained by volunteers and through partnerships for the 2021 season.

Porta-johns were placed in 24 City parks and arrangements made for Republic Services and Priority Waste to continue picking up trash curbside in all City parks.

Capital improvements were made in City parks and Gateway Gardens that included bleachers, benches, picnic tables, park signs, trees and brush removal, removal of hazardous equipment in 3 parks, and remediation of graffiti and installation of 6 new murals on Martin Luther King Ave. in partnership with the Flint Public Art Project.



FLINT RIVERFRONT RESTORATION PROJECT

The Flint River-Swartz Creek Confluence is an approximate 2.5 acre triangular patch of land bordered on the South by W. Kearsley Street, projecting North to a peninsula bordered on the West by Swartz Creek and the Flint River on the East.

Construction for the Swartz Creek
Confluence Green Infrastructure project took
place in the Spring and Summer of 2021. This
project was designed to create recreational river
access on this site and provide green
infrastructure to detain and clean storm-water
that flows across it. The design includes a natural
stone kayak launch at the Swartz Creek shoreline,
steps up the creek bank with a railing-kayak
slide, bio-retention basins, sidewalks and a paved
turnaround with parking.



MARKETING

This year brought a whole new set of challenges for the Marketing department. Many of the usual plans had to be altered to fit the changes in the way people were receiving messages. Due to the pandemic, many people had turned to digital and social media for their information. And the Marketing Department took on the challenge.

One of the biggest changes was how the Parks distributed the annual Family Fun Guide. The 2021 version was the biggest and best one yet. We offered the chance for other local Parks & Rec organizations to join us in sharing all there is offered in the county. Both Davison and Grand Blanc joined in and made it a huge success. The information was shared in a digital format via the Parks website as well as Davison and Grand Blanc's websites, giving access to countless families in Genesee County.
